6. How would you advance partnerships with Caribbean-American community organizations to promote mental health, chronic disease prevention, or other wellness initiatives? I will advance partnerships with Caribbean-American community organizations by building a rapport with and listening to the needs of the Caribbean-American community, to include the promotion of mental health, chronic disease prevention, and wellness initiatives.
7. How will you build trust and conduct robust oversight on local, law enforcement to protect the rights, security, and safety of Caribbean-American residents? As a retired Prince George's County Police Officer who has served and provided safety and security for Caribbean-American residents, I will continue to advocate for the rights, security, and protections of Caribbean-American residents.
8. What programs, funding opportunities, or policy efforts will you champion that are aimed at improving outcomes for Caribbean-American communities? Under my administration, while serving as Mayor of the Town of Eagle Harbor, Maryland, which is one of the last predominately African American waterfront communities remaining in the nation, the town experienced the largest financial benefits of its nearly one hundred-year-old history. I will bring that same skill set to Prince George's County and the Caribbean-American Community. One of opportunities I will champion will be to take advantage of the county's legislative designation of the entire county being a heritage area (CR-038-2025). Using this designation to advertise and attract tourists to Prince George's County will bring jobs, pride, business opportunities, and revenue to the county and entrepreneurs. The county has over 460 historic sites and a proud and diverse population who are eager to share their proud cultures, histories, and footprints in Prince George's County.

According to the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority (MHAA), the State of Maryland brings in approximately 2.4 billion dollars a year in heritage tourism revenue, along with supporting approximately 34,000 jobs. They have calculated that every \$1 invested in heritage tourism brings back approximately \$7 dollars to the economy.

Prince George's County, using just a small portion of historic-heritage locations throughout the county, brings in over 36 million dollars in revenue per year which supports over 500 jobs. I will push to expand this
